

Lifelines: Impacts and Actions VSP is working with local police departments, the Department of Safety and Security Buildings and General Services, and a sheriff's department on traffic control and security at food distribution sites. As states begin to lift their restrictions, travel could become more prevalent and lead to an increased risk of virus transmission. • The combined FEMA Food Box / Farmers to Families food distribution sites began at the beginning of May. Yesterday the site at the Franklin County Airport in Highgate/Swanton distributed 1,000 CFAP perishable household sets (including chicken, produce, dairy and milk), and 2,280 boxes (of 15 box-meals) of non-perishable meals. As of 2pm today, the Lyndonville site estimates it will distribute 1,000 perishable household sets and over 4,000 non-perishable boxes. (# not • The next meal distribution sites will be held, Monday, June 1st, 10am-2pm at the Rutland Regional Airport in North Clarendon. The June 1 Food, Water, Sheltering through June 5 sites will distribute all remaining emergency nonperishable box food ordered in April. ACCD continues to work in close contact with the Vermont Retail Grocers' Association to monitor supply chain issues. As of 5/28, the supply chain is in good shape outside of flour and yeast, sugar, cleaning supplies, meat, pasta, canned vegetables, and box prepared products. AHS, ACCD, VAAFM, and DPS are working with other state, local, and non-profit partners to stand up a new program to serve meals to those in need, beginning in the Brattleboro area. Within the next few weeks, the Brattleboro program aims to provide 600 meals, 4 days per week for one month. Efforts are underway to expand this model to provide healthy, local food in other parts of the state. · Child Development Division (CDD) is participating in a multi-agency, statewide distribution on June 1st and 2nd of cloth facial coverings, soap, and thermometers to CDD providers, summer day camps, Office of Economic Opportunity shelter staff, and state employees. • The Agency of Education is working on finalizing guidance to schools on maximizing use of federal funds and identifying cloth mask / other PPE needs from schools. AOT is staffing border crossings for the State's monitoring of traffic mobility to determine how effective mitigation measures are for **Transportation** reducing travel and also to give healthcare leaders a sense of future healthcare capacity needs. All vehicles (Vermont and out-of-state) are being counted; license plate numbers are not being recorded. As industries begin to open up the current social distancing protocols may prove to be challenging on bus routes.

The addendum also allows for social gatherings of up to 25 people in any confined indoor or outdoor spaces (also effective June 1st) but does not change the occupancy limits previously established for businesses, non-profits, and government entities.
