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Background / Current Situation

On May 20, 2020 the Vermont State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) was fully activated from 0800 to 1600, using a completely virtual structure. The SEOC will be fully activated during the week and partially activated through the weekend until further notice.

Key Updates:

- The next meal distribution sites will be held on Thursday, May 21st, 10am-2pm at Thetford Academy, 304 Academy Rd, Thetford and on Friday, May 22, 10am-2pm at Lamoille Union High School, 736 VT Route 15W, Hyde Park.
 - The full list of dates and locations can be found at vem.vermont.gov/pods
- Today, Governor Scott proposed a \$400 million economic relief and recovery package, using funds from the \$1.25 billion the state received from the Federal CARES Act. The two-phase proposal will start with \$310 million for immediate relief to the most impacted sectors and businesses to be followed by \$90 million for long-term recovery efforts. The Agency of Commerce and Community Development and the Governor will now work with the legislature towards passage of this relief package. The Phase 1 relief package will involve four areas of action. They include:
 - Housing assistance: Rental Housing Stabilization Fund for property owners and a Re-Housing Recovery Fund to address homeless need. (\$50MM)
 - Financial assistance: Emergency Action Grants for food and accommodation services, retail, and agriculture, Vermont Economic Injury Disaster Loan and Grant program, and small business focused Vermont Restart loans and grants. (\$250MM)
 - Technical assistance: Restart Vermont Recovery Guides, and Employee Assistance Program to support the mental health and wellbeing of business owners and their families. (\$5MM)
 - Marketing support: Promotional marketing campaign to promote Vermont to Vermonters and deliver a toolkit of creative assets to be used by local communities, and regional marketing and consumer stimulus grants to encourage local spending, with implementation strategies to be proposed by local entities. (\$5MM)

5/18-5/19 Call Statistics from 211:

- 211 received 115 calls related to COVID-19 on Monday and Tuesday. Most calls were from the general public (90 calls), with 13 calls from businesses.
- The most common call topics were the executive order (54 calls), travel (26 calls), and testing (19 calls) (topics are not mutually exclusive, i.e., calls can touch on multiple topics).

FEMA

- A Major Disaster Declaration has been approved for Vermont: FEMA-4532-DR-VT
- FEMA is tracking the following Resource Request Forms (RRFs) in progress:
 - Testing materials, including nasal swabs and test tubes
 - HEPA filters
 - PPE including gloves, coveralls, aprons, boot covers, and N95 masks
 - 2 truckloads of boxed meals arrived today (5/20). 3 more truckloads are scheduled to arrive tomorrow (5/21).
 - Powered air-purifying respirators (PAPRs)
- Outside of the RRF process, FEMA is procuring donations of Dial soap and bulk sanitizer on behalf of Vermont. FEMA is also securing cloth face coverings.
 - Three bulk sanitizer totes are scheduled to arrive tomorrow (5/21).

- **Resource Requests:**

- ◊ BGS is working on coordinating portable restrooms, hand wash stations and sheriff coverage for the additional food distribution sites.
- ◊ BGS ordered 1,500 additional thermometers with a partial order expected delivery date of 5/25.
- ◊ BGS acquired gallon containers for the bulk hand sanitizer donation by Exxon.
- ◊ AOT is delivering 2,500 face shields and 47,670 face coverings to the SNS warehouse.
- ◊ AOT is providing cones to temporary testing sites across the state.
- ◊ AOT is distributing face coverings for state employees in Randolph, Dummerston and White River Jct.

- ◊ Providing distribution of food at various sites across the state with support from AOT, currently scheduled until May 29th.

- ◊ Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) medical volunteer activity:
 - 63 volunteers, 20 activated- 13 of whom are deployed as screeners at Northeast Vermont Regional Hospital.
 - The Southern Vermont Medical Center asked for volunteers to be Specimen Collection Assistants and Test Schedulers, but has yet to provide final details
 - NVRH has requested additional screeners in the near future.
 - 211 will be reactivating volunteers for the call center.
 - 765 accepted volunteers, 378 since 3/1
- ◊ Temporary Employee Activity:
 - Requested positions- 169, approved and created- 165
 - Positions posted in recruitment- 50
 - Applications received -468
 - Offers Made - 6

Economic Mitigation and Recovery Task Force

AGENCY OF COMMERCE AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT (ACCD):

- Governor Scott today announced his proposal for a \$400 million economic relief and recovery package, using funds from the \$1.25 billion the State received from the Federal CARES Act. The two-phase proposal will start with \$310 million for immediate relief to the most impacted sectors and businesses to be followed by \$90 million for long-term recovery efforts. The specifics of the first phase are as follows:
 - ◊ **Financial assistance** - Emergency Action Grants for food and accommodation services, retail, and agriculture, Vermont Economic Injury Disaster Loan and Grant Program, and small-business-focused Vermont Restart Loans and Grants. (\$250 million)
 - ◊ **Housing assistance** - Rental Housing Stabilization Fund for property owners. Re-Housing Recovery Fund for address homeless need. (\$50 million)
 - ◊ **Technical assistance** - Restart Vermont Recovery Guides created through a network of business and community assistance providers. Employee Assistance Program to support the mental health and wellbeing of business owners and their families (\$5 million)
 - ◊ **Marketing support** - Promotional marketing campaign to promote Vermont to Vermonters and deliver a toolkit of creative assets to be used by local communities. Regional marketing and consumer stimulus grants to encourage local spending, implementation to be proposed by local entities. (\$5 million)

- ReStart Vermont Updates:
 - ◊ Vermont's State Parks will open this summer but will not offer overnight camping until June 25th and will be cancelling all reservations prior to that date. Park attendance limits will be reduced, and parks will not offer equipment rentals or concessions this summer. Day use visitors are encouraged to bring chairs and blankets for their visit as common area picnic tables and seating will be removed.
 - ◊ Pools, beaches and swimming facilities may open in accordance with previously issued outdoor recreation and fitness guidance. Operators must reduce high contact surfaces and common areas, limit gatherings of people to 10 or less, and regularly clean and disinfect restrooms and other common facilities per CDC guidelines.
 - ◊ Yard sales and garage sales with 10 or fewer people may be held. Hosts and visitors must practice social distancing and it is recommended that they wear cloth face coverings.
 - ◊ Services operating with a single worker or small office environments (such as appraisers, realtors, municipal clerks, attorneys, property managers, pet care operators, and others) may operate if they can comply with the mandatory health and safety requirements listed

- ◊ above, with no more than 10 persons (service provider and clients) present at one time.
 - ◊ ACCD posted new guidance for the reopening of lodging establishments and cross-border travel. Lodging operations, short-term rentals, campgrounds and marinas may accept overnight reservations for stays after May 22, 2020 from Vermont residents or those who have met the 14-day quarantine requirement. Individuals coming from out-of-state cannot complete their quarantine in a lodging facility, short term rental or campground.

- Restart Webinars for Businesses Sectors:

Panelists provided valuable tips and knowledge to ensure businesses are meeting COVID-19 operating requirements and using current best practices.
 - ◊ Hospitality - On Thursday, May 21st at 9:00 AM the Lake Champlain Chamber will host a webinar called, “Adapting Vermont Hospitality to COVID-19” to address the unique challenges the hospitality industry has faced and to discuss a path forward as the economy begins to reopen.
