Background / Current Situation

On June 29, 2020 the Vermont State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) was partially activated from 0800 to 1600, using a completely virtual structure. The SEOC will be partially activated every day until further notice.

Key Updates:

On Friday, the Vermont legislature passed 3 bills disbursing aid from the federal CARES Act, appropriating funds for healthcare organizations and workers (<u>H.965</u>); for broadband internet expansion, housing initiatives, and economic relief for businesses and individuals (<u>H.966</u>); and for agricultural and forestry businesses (<u>S.351</u>). The bills will now be reviewed by the governor.

6/26-6/28 Call Statistics from 211:

- 211 received 53 calls related to COVID-19 on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. The vast majority of calls were from the general public (51 calls).
- The most common call topics were travel (19 calls), testing (17 calls), and the executive order (12 calls) (topics are not mutually exclusive, i.e., calls can touch on multiple topics).

- Currently there are 63 reported power outages, down from a peak of 160 during the day.

Emergency Services-

- Over the weekend, fire crews from Swanton, Highgate, and St. Albans Town battled a fully involved fire in an abandoned barn and house in Swanton. There were no reported injuries.
- No reports of absenteeism due to COVID-19.

Operational Period Notes-

- The branch is working on a question about hand sanitizer in schools.
- Climate and drought experts, based on several observed parameters, have placed portions of Vermont and New York into the Moderate Drought (D1) category with much of the remaining area in the Abnormally Dry (D0) category.
